SUMMARY OF GRANT INFORMATION

Increase Access of Vulnerable Populations to HIV/AIDS Prevention and Social Services

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

To increase access by vulnerable populations to high-quality and sustainable HIV/AIDS prevention services in four key provinces in Turkey.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Turkey currently has a low level of HIV infection among the general population. However, people living with HIV encounter social stigma as a result of their HIV infection. This grant funds improvements to the current level of services available to people living with HIV and their families by strengthening the participation of nongovernmental organizations in policy settings and in service delivery areas. The program organizes workshops and training activities for people living with HIV, their families and health care providers, and trains government and nongovernmental organizations and media personnel in issues related to HIV/AIDS and human rights. This grant also funds targeted prevention and treatment interventions for populations at higher risk of contracting HIV, such as commercial sex workers, men who have sex with men, injecting drug users and prisoners. The program establishes or improves voluntary counseling and testing centers in the four targeted provinces and reaches vulnerable groups with rapid HIV tests administered by mobile voluntary counseling and testing units. The program implements HIV/AIDS prevention programs among injecting drug users and prisoners, promotes safer sex among all vulnerable groups and increases access to condoms in prisons, among men who have sex with men and among commercial sex workers.

SUMMARY OF GRANT INFORMATION

Overcoming the HIV/AIDS Epidemic in Ukraine

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

To reduce HIV prevalence and AIDS-related illness and death in Ukraine.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The program supported with this Global Fund grant directly benefits injecting drug users, commercial sex workers and prisoners, people living with and/or affected by HIV/AIDS, children affected by HIV/AIDS, HIV-infected pregnant women, homeless and abandoned children and HIV-infected people at risk of tuberculosis infection. The program provides an uninterrupted supply of antiretrovirals and medical supplies and equipment necessary to administer and monitor effective treatment, and provides the necessary tests to screen for TB. It trains health care providers in the provision of diagnostic and treatment services, in the administration of antiretrovirals and in the treatment of opportunistic infections, as well as HIV/AIDS/TB co-infection. In addition, it develops adherence programs to support injecting drug users in the consistent taking of antiretrovirals. The program develops and maintains prevention services among injecting drug users, commercial sex workers and prisoners and provides substitution therapy schemes for injecting drug users as part of a rehabilitation program. It supports the development of a sustainable self-help movement among people living with HIV/AIDS and vulnerable groups and supports the development of home-based care and psychosocial support services.
