I have over 30 years **professional experience** as a development economist, with particular experience in health economics. This experience includes 25 years as a Director, and member of the Senior Executive Service, of the Australian Agency for International Development, AusAID); 2 years with the World Bank as a Senior Economist (Health) and 4 years with the Asian Development Bank as a Principal Economist (Health). Since 2010 I have been an independent consultant specialising in health economics. I have had (often multiple) assignments with agencies such as the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, DFAT, DFID, European Commission, Ethiopian Ministry of Health, Ernst and Young, Fleming Fund, Global Fund, KFW, New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Oxford Policy Management, Partnership for Maternal Newborn and Child Health, Samoa Ministry of Health, Secretariat for the Pacific Communities, Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (SIDA), UNICEF, University of Queensland, World Bank, and World Health Organization.

I have had multiple in-country assignments in a **wide range of low and middle-income countries**.
