

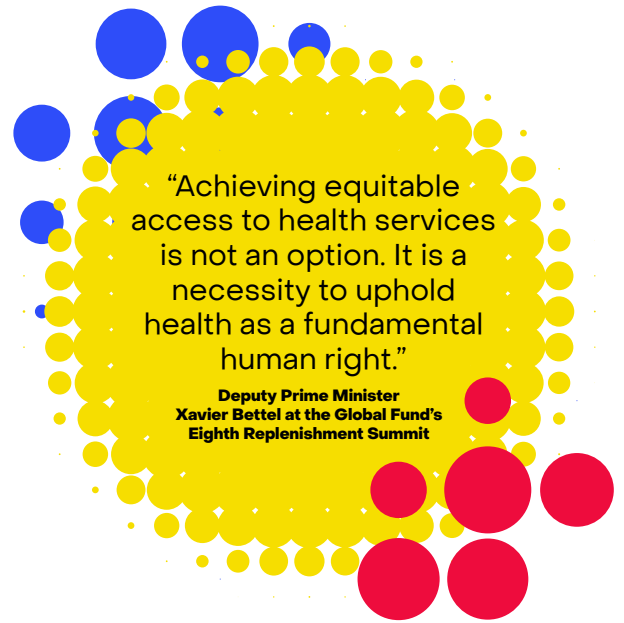
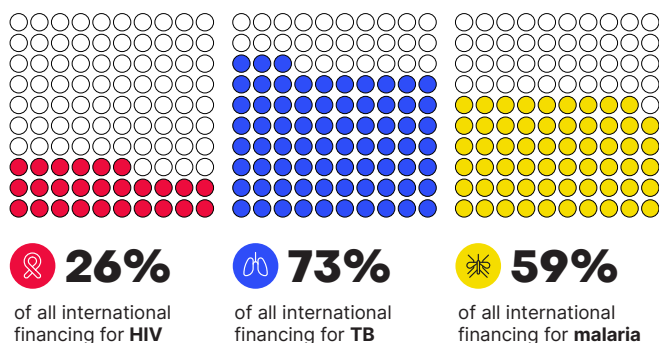

Luxembourg’s longstanding support to the Global Fund has played a crucial role in fighting HIV, tuberculosis (TB) and malaria and in strengthening health systems to advance universal health coverage.

The Global Fund has disbursed over US\$73 billion in more than 100 low- and middle-income countries since 2002 to respond to AIDS, TB and malaria, strengthen health systems and build pandemic preparedness. The majority of our investments go toward countries in sub-Saharan Africa. With contributions from governments, foundations and the private sector, the Global Fund equitably and efficiently allocates funding to partner countries, taking into account each country’s income level and disease burden.

Percentage of international financing provided by the Global Fund in 2024



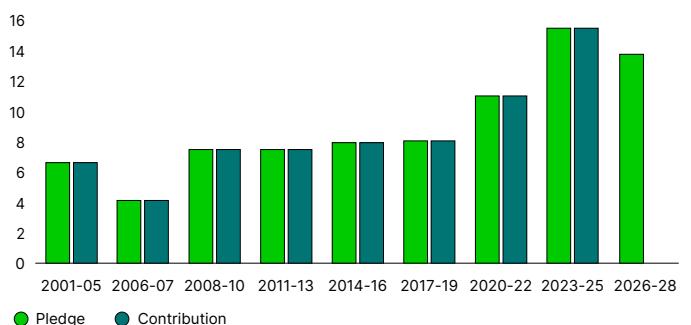
Our partnership

Luxembourg is one of the Global Fund’s largest donors per capita, contributing nearly €69 million to date. Since 2009, Luxembourg has been committed to dedicating at least 1% of its gross national income each year to official development assistance, making the country one of the most generous donors among members of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development. Luxembourg was one of the first donors to announce its support for the Global Fund’s Eighth Replenishment with a pledge of €13.8 million for 2026-2028.

Luxembourg’s government is represented on the Global Fund Board and is a dynamic contributor in shaping Global Fund governance policies, especially those that support human rights, gender equity and resilient community systems.

Adapting to a new landscape

With a focus on complementarity, reduced duplication and stronger country leadership, the Global Fund partnership is helping to build a more coherent, effective and equitable global health system that delivers health care for all.

Our strategic shifts

We are intensifying our focus on maximizing the impact of every dollar to save more lives. This means accelerating the rollout of affordable, scalable innovations – such as lenacapavir for HIV prevention, dual-active-ingredient mosquito nets and spatial emanators for malaria, and AI-enabled X-rays and near-point-of-care TB diagnostics – while ensuring they reach the most at-risk communities. We are prioritizing community-led delivery to overcome cost, stigma and access barriers to health, integrating HIV, TB and malaria services with primary health care where efficient, and concentrating investments where the Global Fund's strengths in market shaping, procurement, and civil society engagement deliver the highest return and long-term sustainability.

The Global Fund is partnering with countries to accelerate their journey to self-reliance by supporting, incentivizing and, ultimately, getting out of the way. Our support is tailored to each country

context and includes working through clear transition timelines, increasing reliance on national systems, and expanding support for public financial management, innovative financing and procurement.

Human rights

The Global Fund has long recognized that breaking down human rights and gender-related barriers to health services is crucial to ending AIDS, TB and malaria. We encourage countries to finance disease interventions in a way that embeds equity, human rights and gender equality in each intervention. Through our catalytic investments, we also mobilize additional resources on top of country grants to address human rights issues in accessing health care.

Women and girls

Women and girls are central to the Global Fund's mission. We invest in focused prevention and treatment programs for adolescent girls and young women, prevention of mother-to-child HIV transmission, malaria prevention in pregnancy, integrated maternal health services, and economic empowerment initiatives. Global Fund-backed grassroots initiatives such as the HER Voice Fund and Voix EssentiELLES are supporting young women and community-led organizations in over 15 African countries to drive gender equality and improve health outcomes.

Our role in shaping the global health ecosystem

The Global Fund is playing a central role in advancing reform of the global health architecture by promoting greater coordination, efficiency and country-centered approaches. Recognizing the fragmentation of the current system and increasing resource constraints, we are actively working with partners to streamline financing and align efforts around national priorities. A key principle guiding this reform is focusing on where external funding adds the most value – such as global public goods, support for the lowest-income countries and responses to health emergencies – while encouraging greater domestic investment over time.

The Global Fund is deepening collaboration across the ecosystem, particularly with organizations like Gavi, WHO and Unitaïd, by aligning country engagement, co-investing in health systems and pursuing shared operational services. Partnerships with the World Bank, regional institutions such as the African Union and the private sector further strengthen financing, health systems resilience and innovation. Overall, our approach to reform emphasizes complementarity, reduced duplication and stronger country leadership, helping to build a more coherent, effective and equitable global health system.

Malawi: Investing for impact

Since 2003, the Global Fund has invested over US\$2.1 billion in Malawi, helping drive major progress against HIV, TB and malaria while strengthening health systems. HIV infections and AIDS-related deaths fell by 86% between 2002 and 2024, with close to a 1 million people on treatment and near achievement of the UNAIDS 95-95-95 targets. TB detection and treatment success improved, with mortality declining by 50%. Malaria deaths have dropped by 55%, supported by expanded mosquito net coverage.

Despite these gains, challenges persist, such as ongoing HIV treatment adherence concerns among children. Malawi also remains among the highest TB/HIV burden countries, with gaps in case detection and drug-resistant TB management. Malaria remains hyper-endemic, accounting for almost a quarter of all outpatient medical visits.

Global Fund support remains critical in supporting resilient health systems in Malawi, financing essential patient-centered care, prevention, and community-based services.

The Global Fund is a worldwide partnership to defeat AIDS, TB and malaria and ensure a healthier, safer, more equitable future for all. We raise and invest up to US\$4 billion a year to fight the deadliest infectious diseases, challenge the injustice that fuels them, and strengthen health systems and pandemic preparedness in more than 100 of the hardest hit countries. We unite world leaders, communities, civil society, health workers and the private sector to find solutions that have the most impact, and we take them to scale worldwide. Since 2002, the Global Fund partnership has saved 70 million lives.
